Abstract

The image of the ideal city established by God inspired efforts in Medieval and Renaissance Europe to replicate or foreshadow in earthly cities the heavenly city which Christian imagination envisages. The cities of that time prove to be, therefore, a rich stimulus to the interpretation of those biblical visions in which the New Jerusalem is portrayed in architectural terms. This lecture will offer a study of four characteristics in particular that Christians of the Medieval era supposed would be present in the city of God, and it will show how these characteristics remain evident in the architecture of European cities.
